


Figure 1 Government aid (grants and loans) by jurisdiction, all students, in millions, \$2.98M total

Adequate student financial support is a key component towards attracting a diverse student body, especially for students with significant need. Growth in McGill's needbasedaid programs made possible by the University's commitment to set-aside a portion of new revenue derived from tuition increases student financial support. McGill offersseveralprograms to assist students in need, which are available to attribel (or "deemed full-time" 1) students in degree programs: bursaries, lothest are interestfree during studies, a Work StudyProgram, tuition fee deferrals. There are also special undergraduate bursaryprogramslinked to admissions and mobility for offempus experiences.

In-Course Bursary Program

Forundergraduates In-Coursebursariesmeet their ongoing needs Entrance bursary recipients tend to return for aid in subsequent years, but there are also students weithly emerging financial difficulties in their upperears of studyseeking support for the first time This was especially the case due to COVID. Apperiodia ows an increase of 28.6% undergraduate In Coursebursary dollars and an increase 64% in the number of undergraduate recipients compared to the prior year.

Graduatestudents may also apply for-Dourseaid for unanticipated financial difficulties emergencies or temporarinterruptions in graduatefunding. Appendix 1 shows an increase of 38.6% in bursary dollars and any increase in the number of graduate recriptions compared to the prior year. While the majority this envelope continues to be directed to those receiving government and how dependent children are in their final year of study, there is a steady crease of recipients who do not fit this typical profile. The proliferation of recipients is connected to to gent pandemic elated needs.

Overall, the combined spending of all bursaries for all studen 2020/21 was 24% higher than in the previous year. Thanks to increased funding, University had the ability to respond to studentsin financial need with higher amounts of aid.

Pandemic response to the economic impact of COVID on students, the University provided dedicated funds to assist with relocation, quarantine, tools for remote studies, fout pocket expenses related to cancelled mobility opportunities, unexpected job loss pedses due to the pandemic. For FY20 and FY21 combined, 56% of these funded were provided by Quebec's Ministry of Education and 36% of funds were raised by University Advancement towards COVID Student Emergency Bursaries, thanks to the generous supportors.

In 2020/21, 1289 unique students received COM/Deted aid amounting to \$2,781,874. This compares to 404 unique students receiving \$722,983 in the prior year from/Manidh campus closures to fiscal year end of April 30, 2020. Considering all GOM/Ded aid cumulative to date, undergraduate/graduate distribution was 71%/29%, with 97% aid in the form of non-repayable bursaries. 63% of dollars went to international students, many of whom were not eligible for federal relief programs.

McGill Loans

Loans while not the preferred form of aid, continue to be essentially are used botton establish higher packages of aid for students who are not indebted through government student loans as well as to bridge funding or example, many shorterm loans were issued to government aid recipients who experienced payment delays, and these interested in the repaid once their funding was in hand.

A robust financial aid program is fundamental to strategic recruitment and retention. It supports universal access and improves diversity


