






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


Course participants and facilitators in Nepal


he Third International Course on Trauma and Global Health was held from March 3 to 9, 2009, as part of the capacity building objective of the Trauma & Global Health Program in Nepal. The course sought to develop a broader understanding of psychological trauma, social and cultural psychiatry, and met an important need in Nepal, where decades of armed confict and natural disasters have caused considerable social and psychic suffering, but where mental health remains the least prioritized sector of health care. The course was attended by thirty-two participants, primarily psychiatrists and senior faculty members in psychology.

The program was the result of a collaborative effort between the Centre for Victims of Torture (CVICT), the Institute of Medicine at Tribhuvan University Teaching Hospital (IOM-TUTH), and the Douglas Hospital Research Centre (DHRC)/McGill University. Professors Duncan Pedersen, Laurence Kirmayer and Jaswant Guzder from McGill University and Professor VD Sharma, Dr. Bhogendra Sharma and Mark Jordans from Nepal facilitated the course.









in brief

As part of the capacity building and knowl edge transfer objectives of the Trauma & Global Health Program, the People's Rural Development Association (PRDA) held a workshop on Wellbeing, Mental Health & Community Care at the National Institute of Mental Health in Angoda, March 24 - 25, 2009. The workshop aimed at disseminating the results of research carried out in Sri Lankan communities profoundly affected by confict and disaster. It also provided a forum for discussion about community-based mental health services that are considered culturally appropriate and socially acceptable to rural Sri Lankan communities. Mental health professionals and community workers involved in mental health and psychosocial care activities were in attendance.

McGill University is in the process of choosing a new web collaboration tool. Marratech was purchased by Google and will be phased out by the end of the year. A new web tool is expected to be launched in September. This and other communications issues will be discussed at the Trauma & Global Health Program meeting in Montreal at the end of April.

An upcoming book by Trauma & Global Health Program team members Chamindra Weerackody and Suman Fernando presents a unique study of mental health and wellbeing as defined by two Sri Lankan communities with distinct experiences of either confict (Puttalam District, home to a significant population of internally displaced Muslims) or natural disaster (Hambantota District, devastated by the 2004 tsunami). In addition to sharing insights that will be of special interest to policymakers, the authors propose a training program for relief workers in areas affected by confict and natural disasters and further suggest a model for developing community-based mental health services in rural areas of countries such as Sri Lanka. The book's editors are Gameela Samarasinghe, Senior Lecturer in Psychology at Colombo University in Sri Lanka and Hanna Kienzler, PhD candidate in the Department of Anthropology at McGill University in Canada.




